Previously, he served as CEO of the Donaldson Adoption Institute for over a decade and had a Pulitzer-nominated 20 year journalistic career at the Boston Globe. Mr. Pertman has provided hundreds of keynotes and other presentations across the U.S. and internationally and regularly appears in the media on child/family welfare issues. He is the author of the acclaimed Adoption Nation and recipient of numerous awards. He and his wife are the parents of two children by adoption.

Allison Davis Maxon, LMFT, is a nationally recognized expert, advocate and trainer in the fields of child welfare and children's mental health. For more than 25 years, she has dedicated her clinical work to expert programs and practices in children's mental health, trauma, attachment family systems and adoption/permanency notably at the Kinship Center of CA. In 2017, she joined the NCAP Team as Chief Operating Officer and is a clinical member of ATTACh. Ms. Maxon has authored various articles/training resources and was awarded an "Angels in Adoption" Award in 2017 from the Congressional Coalition on Adoption Institute.

National adoption experts, Adam Pertman and Allison Davis Maxon, LMFT, presenting together for this Adoption Month conference will offer valuable knowledge, insights and inspiration enabling children and their families to succeed! Drawing from extensive research/evidence and broad experience relating to adoption policy and clinical practice they will provide a framework to help professionals and caregivers facilitate permanency-focused, attachment-based care and services. Trauma, neglect and multiple attachment disruptions all have a signifcant negative impact on a child's ability to learn the interpersonal skills needed for their primary attachment and developmental needs to be met. In her specialized presentation, Ms. Maxon will educate on Attachment Theory and how family systems attachment therapy empowers the family system to become the healing source for the child. *This training is pending approval by the CT Chapter of NASW for six (6) CEC's.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- Identify Attachment Theory, types of attachment patterns and how a crisis in the attachment relationship is an opportunity for change and healing.
- Describe how family systems attachment therapy empowers the family system to become the healing mechanism for the child.
- Describe how attachment-deflecting behaviors serve as a protective mechanism for a child not rooted in permanency. Strength based approach empowers parents to lead the 'dance of attachment'.
- Identify the key clinical constructs of adoption/permanency competent and trauma informed family systems practice with foster, adoptive and kin families.
- Practice utilizing a developmental lens to focus treatment on needs, not pathology (tools for practice).
- Understand the difference between 'traditional parenting techniques' which utilize loss, punishment and emotional distance in response to negative behaviors vs therapeutic and attachment-based parenting approaches based on principals of addition and teaching consequences
- Describe the neurobiological effects of trauma and neglect.
- Utilize a developmental lens to decode trauma reactive behaviors and utilize interventions based on pro-active teaching consequences designed to target challenging behaviors.
- Identify the 10 Things Your Child Needs Every Day to feel valued, connected and empowered.
