The Teen Health Information Literacy Project focuses on partnerships with three Native American tribes in New London County. Recognizing that the ability to find, interpret and use reliable sources of health information can have a direct impact on individuals' health, the project teaches these skills to teens in order to improve health outcomes throughout their lives.

The Raising HPV Immunization Rates Through Provider Education program targets health professionals with the message "You Are the Key to Cancer Prevention." To date, more than 270 clinical providers and health professions students have participated in the project. 95% agree that as a result of the training, they are better able to explain to parents/guardians the rationale for vaccinating youth against human papillomavirus (HPV) at ages 11 or 12. One participating physician commented, "[We have a] strong program already in effect; it made a difference but slowed down. We'll ramp up again!"

The statewide Connecticut Area Health Education Center (CT AHEC) Network, based at UConn Health, is implemented through four regional centers which enable the CT AHEC Network to provide high-quality, efficient, effective and flexible services that meet local needs.
