

Keynote Speakers



Valencia P. Walker, MD, MPH

Dr. Walker is a board-certified neonatologist at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, OH. She received her undergraduate degree from Florida A&M University and progressed to medical school at Emory University School of Medicine (completed 05/05/2000). Dr. Walker completed her residency in 2003 at LeBonheur Children's Hospital in Memphis, TN and transitioned into fellowship at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center which she completed in 2006.

Prior to joining Nationwide Children's Hospital, she was an Assistant Dean of Equity and Diversity Inclusion for the David Geffen School of Medicine UCLA and received a MPH in Health Policy from Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health.

In addition to providing dedicated and compassionate patient care, Dr. Walker serves as both the Associate Chief Diversity and Health Equity Officer at Nationwide Children's Hospital and as the Associate Division Chief of Health Equity and Inclusion for the Division of Neonatology and Vice Chair of Diversity of Neonatology and Vice Chair of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion for the Department of Pediatrics at The Ohio State University College of Medicine.

Her clinical and academic passions focus on the elimination of maternal and infant health inequities. She has collaborated with CelebrateOne's Strategic Planning Operational Working Group which focuses on decreasing infant mortality rates amongst Black babies in the Columbus, OH area. Most recently, she has been elected to the Executive Committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics' Section on Minority Health Equity and Inclusion, in addition to her current position as Program Chair for the Section.

Dr. Walker is involved with nine different medical publications including: "Identification and Management of Pediatric Sepsis: A Medical Student Curricular Supplement for PICU and NICU Rotations" By Nicole B. Anderson, Mai-King Chan, Cristina Gutierrez, Kristi Kambestad, Valencia P. Walker, and "Cord Blood Vitamin D Status Impacts Innate Immune Responses" by Valencia P. Don C. Sawyer III, Ph.D.

Dr. Don C. Sawyer III was born and raised in Harlem, New York. A first-generation college student, Dr. Sawyer graduated from Hartwick College with a B.A. in Psychology in 1999. Driven to continue his education, Dr. Sawyer enrolled at Syracuse University, where he graduated with a Ph.D. in Sociology in 2013, after earning his M.A. in Sociology in 2008 and his M.S. in Cultural Foundations of Education in 2003. He currently serves as the Vice President for Equity, Inclusion, and Leadership Development at Quinnipiac University in Hamden, Connecticut. Dr. Sawyer is a tenured associate professor in the Department of Sociology, Criminal Justice, and Anthropology in the College of Arts and Sciences. He also serves as an assistant clinical professor in the Frank H. Netter MD School of Medicine at Quinnipiac.

Dr. Sawyer teaches courses exploring race, education, popular culture, and social research methods, including the university's first course dedicated to the sociological study of hip-hop culture. His scholarly focus examines race, social justice, urban education, hip-hop culture, and the reentry experiences of formerly incarcerated individuals. Dr. Sawyer is an applied sociologist who believes deeply in research-driven social change. He works with and for communities, always guided by the steadfast principle that sociological practice should be used as a tool to benefit society. Dr. Sawyer has worked diligently to nurture healthy relationships between academic and student affairs throughout his career. He understands that collaborative partnerships create an environment conducive to the successful recruitment, retention, education, and graduation of civically engaged students. He builds on this social consensus to connect with multiple populations and help institutions address complex issues with solutions that engage and empower all community members.

How much time do I have to travel between Zoom rooms?


We have set aside 5 minutes between each presentation for attendees to move between the breakout rooms. Should you have any issues, please return to the main room and our technical support staff will help you.
