TEAM/GROUP PROJECTS

To be considered for a competitive section (oral or poster), **you must select one student to represent the team** because CT HSSHHS provides awards and will only award them to one person. This person must acknowledge their team member(s) and what role(s) they played in the project as part of their registration ("Student Presenter" pathway in the registration process).

At CT HSSHHS, team members ARE allowed to present together in the STEM Poster Exhibition (non-competitive).

To summarize, there are two options:

1. Present your project as a team (in that case your application **WILL NOT** be considered for the competitive oral or poster presentation categories of CT HSSHHS).
 - Registration instructions ("Student Presenter" pathway): Provide the exact same title and abstract on both/all of your applications/registrations.
 - The team's application will be reviewed for potential participation in the non-competitive STEM Poster Exhibition.
2. One team member will be designated by the team to represent the team's project with the hope of being selected for one of CT HSSHHS's competitive sections (oral or poster).
 - Registration instructions ("Student Presenter" pathway): Only one team member should apply/register as a presenter. That person must mention the other team member(s) in the abstract and when prompted on the registration/application materials.
 - The other team members not designated to present the team's research should apply/register as "Student Non-Presenter".

NOTE: In either case, both/all students involved in the research project need to register for CT HSSHHS and are counted individually as part of the maximum of 10 for the school's delegation, assuming both/all team members attend the same school, and assuming the one(s) not applying to present competitively would still want to attend as "Student Non-Presenter." (If the 10-per-school delegation limit is an issue for your school, let us know.)

NOTE: In the instance that a research team decides to diverge and develop two different projects from their joint idea—different enough to **create two submissions**—each “Student Presenter” will register separately and present the portion of the project that each was responsible for. Both projects will be required to have titles and abstracts that are divergent enough so that the separation is clear for the reviewers.
