Bristol EMS Cardiac Arrest Save



When a construction worker in Bristol dropped to the pavement in cardiac arrest last month, his friend immediately started CPR. **Bristol Police George Franek** arrived on the scene with a AED and delivered one shock. **Bristol EMS** ambulance crew (Paramedic David Kozikowski, AEMT Jay Pax, and EMT Melissa Patrick) arrived within moments and assumed care of the patient who regained consciousness. He was taken directly from the scene to **John Dempsey Hospital** where he underwent cardiac catheterization and implantation of an internal defibrillator. Nine days later, he walked out of the hospital and returned home, grateful for a friend who knew CPR and for the quick response of Bristol police and EMS services. Well done!

EMS Drugs: Ativan to Zofran

If you are an EMT, have you ever wondered what drugs are in a paramedic's medication kit and what they are used for? If you are a medic, have you asked yourself if you are using your medication arsenal to its fullest extent?



In our June CME, From Ativan to Zofran, EMS Drugs for All Providers, an interactive discussion of EMS medications, Dr. Richard Kamin will review indications and contraindications, and offer PEARLS and pitfalls of the drugs carried by paramedics in the North Central region, including answering these questions:



How can a knowledge of a paramedic's medications affect an EMT's practice?

What are the most underutilized medications? What is the most dangerous drug? If a medic could only carry 8 drugs, which should they be, in order from 8-1?

What new drugs can we expect in the future? Are any medications likely to be approved for BLS providers?

This session is designed for all levels of providers. There will be plenty of opportunity for questions and discussion. The lecture will be offered twice. On June 13th at 7:30 P.M. and June 20 at 8:30 A.M.
