# ~2025 Commencement Important Reminders~

UConn Health Commencement is scheduled for **Monday**, **May** 12, 2025 from 1:00-2:30 pm in the **Jorgenson Auditorium** at **Storrs**. If you are planning to graduate in May <u>OR</u> August 2025 and plan to participate in the commencement ceremony, you must be sure to complete the following steps:

>>APPLY for graduation via the Student Admin portal no later than Saturday, March 1 Instructions on applying for graduation may be found here. Dual Degree students MUST complete this step for EACH degree program (e.g., DMD & PhD, MD & MPH, etc.); Please note: After applying, the instructions ask you to submit a final plan of study in Student Admin: this does not apply for the M.D., D.M.D. or graduate degrees.

When you apply for graduation, **you will enter your degree** (**diploma**) **name** in Student Admin. This entry will be used for ordering your diploma and also in commencement publications. Degree names should be entered *exactly how you want them to appear* on your diploma including upper and lowercase letters and punctuation. If you had or will have a legal name change prior to graduation, you <u>must</u> complete the <u>Biographical Update Request Form</u> and submit it with your documentation provided on the form's website in addition to entering your Degree name.

>>COMPLETE the UConn Health info form found here.

>>ORDER your cap and gown through the <u>\*UConn Health\*</u>

March 7 IMPT: Do NOT order from the main campus at Storrs, as you will receive the wrong color for your regalia!

>>VIEW UNOFFICIAL TRANSCRIPT in Student Admin. All students are advised to review their unofficial transcript in PeopleSoft/Student Admin. You can <u>find instructions here on how to view your unofficial transcript.</u> Any missing grades, documents, or discrepancies can result in a delay of degree conferral.

# -Diversity Corner-

Greetings from the Office for Diversity and Inclusion (ODI).

We've received many inquiries from the UConn Health community about the current state of DEI efforts across UConn & beyond. Please know we share your concerns and are working to answer questions to the best of our ability, given how quickly new information is being released. We are focusing on two lanes of consideration, which are not mutually exclusive from each other but are helping to inform the stakeholders we are engaging & reflect the main themes of the queries we are hearing.

First is the question of what we can & cannot do in the DEI space, so we are looking at the DEI infrastructure across UConn, including information on websites, curriculum, trainings, grants/research, positions/offices/committees, & student life & enrollment. Second, and most importantly, is the harm experienced by the students, staff, & faculty most directly impacted by recent directives, including, but not limited to, undocumented/mixed status/international/immigrant communities, trans/non-binary communities, faculty, students & staff of color, & Native American & Indigenous

As the landscape of DEI is evolving rapidly, we encourage you to contact ODI directly (diversity@uconn.edu; 860.486.2422) with specific questions/concerns, so we can discuss the nuances & particulars of each situation. We also want to communicate that DEI efforts across UConn can & are continuing, unless & until we are required to pivot. We do suggest that departments do an inventory of the programs that could be potentially impacted so we can make informed pivots should that be necessary. In the meantime, here are some ways that ODI supports the UConn Health community, organized into three areas of focus: education, advocacy, and sense of belonging:

- >>We offer workshops, trainings, & one-on-one consultations for individuals & depts., as well as programs open to the UCH community at large, developed with collaborators across UConn & designed to meet the requestors' & participants' specific goals.
- >>Our advocacy work happens at the individual and institutional levels. We provide direct support to individuals who are experiencing bias, harassment, and/or discrimination, and work to ensure our institutional responses & organizational climate reflect our commitments to access & equity across all units & to diversity as crucial to our mission to enhance the health & well-being of every citizen of the State of Connecticut.
- >>Finally, we create spaces where people can find community while feeling welcomed & positioned to thrive & where we affirm the value of an inclusive environment & the diversity within our workforce. 

>>On November 13, 2024, **Dr. Ruth Lucas** was recognized by the Connecticut Nurses Association's (CNA) Diamond Jubilee Awards as the Virginia Henderson Award for Dedication to Nursing Research. These distinguished awards, named after some of the most impactful nurses in Connecticut's history, recognize nurses who have given outstanding contributions to the profession through research, policy, and to the Association. Dr. Lucas serves as a member of the Executive Committee for the Master of Science in Clinical and Translational Research program.

>>Dr. Cato T. Laurencin, University Professor and Albert and Wilda Van Dusen Distinguished Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery, received the Gold Key Award from the Sigma Xi Scientific Research Honor Society. In addition, Laurencin was the keynote speaker for the International Forum on Research Excellence, Sigma Xi's annual conference. The Gold Key Award is the Society's highest honor, presented to a member who has made extraordinary contributions to their profession and fostered critical innovations to enhance the health of the research enterprise, to cultivate integrity in research, or to promote the public understanding of science for the purpose of improving the human condition.
