

The Aetna Health Professions Partnership Initiative (HPPI) programs sponsored by the Department of Health Career Opportunity Programs are recognized as a national model. In 1996, UConn Health, along with the Hartford School District, Central Connecticut State University, the University of Connecticut, and Wesleyan University, developed the Aetna HPPI in response to the Association of American Medical Colleges' Project 3000 By 2000 initiative to increase the number of students from underrepresented groups in the health professions.

The Department of Health Career Opportunity Programs provides John & Valerie Rowe Scholarships in the form of book awards to Senior Doctors Academy students from the Aetna HPPI Doctors Academy who will enroll as freshmen at UConn. Dr. John D. Rowe and Dr. Valerie A. Rowe, are long-time donors to UConn, supporting students and institutional advancement. The Rowe Health Professions Scholars Program Endowment has helped hundreds of students from underrepresented populations succeed in UConn's undergraduate, medical, and graduate programs through scholarships, academic, and experiential opportunities. Dr. John Rowe is a professor of health policy and management at Columbia University and former chairman and CEO of Aetna, Inc. He previously served as Chairman of the UConn Board of Trustees and the UConn Health Board of Directors. Dr. John Rowe was awarded the Carole and Ray Neag Medal of Honor for his remarkable contributions to medicine and UConn Health. Dr. Valerie Rowe is a retired clinical associate professor at the Graduate School of Education at Fordham University.

Health Professions Partnership Initiative Doctors Academy

- Offers a 4-week summer program and a 21-week academic year Saturday academy for 8th-12th graders, and focuses on science, math, and English.
- Includes PSAT and SAT preparation, as well as college and health/STEM career mentoring and exploration.
 - The Great Explorations (8th grade)
 - The Jumpstart Academy (9th & 10th grade)
 - The Junior Doctors Academy (11th grade)
 - The Senior Doctors Academy (12th grade)
- The Doctors Academy program also offers a \$4,000 full fellowship to cover the program cost and a stipend is offered to eligible students for full participation.

Nikay graduated from Bulkeley High School and the Senior Doctors Academy, Class of 2022.




Nikay is a current student at Johns Hopkins University, and is studying Computer Science and Mathematics.

I learned more about different fields within healthcare (medicine, dentistry, public health), and I gained a variety of research experience (including in biological software and health disparities, neither of which I had experience in). I also gained valuable test-taking and resume building skills, which helped me gain acceptance in UConn's competitive Rowe Scholars Program which was another key pillar in my success. Thanks to Health Career Opportunity Programs, I never felt alone; I always knew I had multiple resources who would check in on me and encourage me to push myself.

Favorite Junior & Senior Doctors Academy Experience:

One of my fondest memories of the Health Career Opportunity Programs was when we visited UConn Storrs to be a "Husky" for that day with the Rowe Scholars. Even though it was a rainy, overcast day on campus, it was one filled with such optimism and excitement. That day solidified for me where I wanted to be in a couple of years, and what kind of student I wanted to be once I got to college.

Words of Advice and Encouragement:

You have what it takes to achieve anything that you dream of; don't ever let anyone (not even yourself) make you believe otherwise. 
Joshua Crittenden

Joshua graduated from CREC Metropolitan Learning Center and the Senior Doctors Academy, Class of 2014.




Joshua is a UConn graduate, Class of 2018, and a Duke University, Class of 2023 graduate, with a Ph.D. in Environmental Engineering.

Day'Avian graduated from Bulkeley High School and the Senior Doctors Academy, Class of 2022.



Annalyees graduated from CREC Academy of Science and Innovation, and the Senior Doctors Academy, Class of 2022.




Favorite Great Explorations/Jumpstart 9 Experience:


