Understanding Trauma Exposure in Crossover Youth





Modrowski, Chaplo, and Kerig (2023)¹ examined group differences in:

- trauma exposure
- posttraumatic stress symptoms
- offending

among youth involved in the juvenile justice system only versus youth with dual system involvement (i.e., juvenile justice system and child welfare system).



Compared to youth solely involved in the juvenile justice system, crossover youth reported:

- more exposure to traumatic events
- more severe posttraumatic stress symptoms
- more self-reported offending

Who are Crossover Youth?

Youth who have, at some point, experienced maltreatment (sexual abuse, domestic abuse, physical abuse, or neglect) and engaged in offending behavior, regardless of whether they have been formally involved in the child welfare or juvenile justice systems.

1. The Importance of Asking, Not Just Reading Records

More differences in trauma exposure were observed between crossover youth and youth solely involved in juvenile justice system when looking at *self-report measures* versus *system records* alone.

There are significant **benefits in screening youth** for histories of maltreatment rather than relying on administrative records.

2. Crossover Youth are at Higher Risk of Trauma Exposure

Crossover youth report more and varied types of adverse childhood experiences compared to youth solely involved in the juvenile justice system.²

Compared to youth solely involved in the juvenile justice system, *crossover youth are more likely to experience negative outcomes*, which can include:

- mental health difficulties
- substance use problems
- decreased educational attainment
